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Welcome

Thank you for your interest in becoming Chair of Trustees of Parc yr Esgob Trust. Our current Chair is stepping down after leading the organisation through exciting, but challenging times since 2017 when the park's initial restoration phase began.

We are proud of our significant achievements to date, bringing in over £4m of Lottery Heritage funds and additional match funding to restore the park and gardens, create a visitor centre and begin restoring the walled garden – but we believe the Trust has other exciting chapters ahead.

We are now seeking an experienced chair to provide strategic leadership for the next phase of this ambitious charity which cares for one of Wales's most remarkable and important historic sites, ensuring that this extraordinary place continues to inspire, educate and belong to future generations.



Why This Place Matters



Before the village, before the church, before the palace, there was a landscape. The meeting of the Rivers Tywi and Gwili created a place that has attracted people for thousands of years, giving the landscape meaning.

The Ogham Stone on the site of St David's Church next to the park, reminds us that this was already a place of significance in the earliest centuries of Christian Wales, whilst the traditions surrounding Myrddin remind us that history is preserved not only in documents, but also in memory and imagination.

In the thirteenth century Bishop Thomas Bek recognised the importance of this place when he established his collegiate foundation, creating a centre of worship, learning and administration that would influence Wales for centuries.

The Palace of the Bishops of St. Davids later became one of the intellectual centres of Wales. Here Richard Davies, William Salesbury and Thomas Huet translated the New Testament and the Book of Common Prayer into Welsh, laying foundations that helped secure the future of the Welsh language and contributing to what historians have described as the Welsh Renaissance. Today, the old Bishop's Palace is home to Carmarthenshire Museum.

Together, the Palace, Museum, Park and Walled Garden create an exceptional heritage destination where visitors can experience more than eight centuries of Welsh history within a remarkable landscape.

About the Trust

Parc yr Esgob Trust was established by the Wales Historic Gardens trust in 2016 to restore, manage and protect Bishop's Park and its unique cultural and natural setting for the benefit of everyone. Working alongside Carmarthenshire County Council, the Church in Wales, volunteers and our wider community, we are ensuring that it continues to inspire and welcome people of all ages.

Parc yr Esgob is far more than a public park. It is a place where landscape, history, faith, language, learning and community have shaped one another over many centuries. You do not need to be a historian, a gardener or a heritage enthusiast to appreciate what makes our park special. Some visitors come to discover its rich history, others to enjoy nature, walk the dog, cycle the Tywi Valley Path, spend time with family or simply relax over lunch in the café. Together, these experiences create a welcoming and inclusive destination that contributes to the wellbeing of our communities while helping to secure the Park's long-term sustainability.

A Trust at an Exciting Stage of Development

The Trust has already achieved a great deal, but we believe many more exciting opportunities lie ahead.

The recent opening of the Tywi Valley Path places Abergwili at the gateway to one of Wales's most attractive active travel routes. Growing visitor numbers present exciting opportunities to welcome new audiences, encourage longer visits and develop sustainable sources of income that can be reinvested in caring for the park.

During 2027, we will celebrate the reopening of the restored Walled Garden. This will become a major new attraction, creating opportunities for horticultural interpretation, volunteering, education, community engagement and events.

The Trust is ambitious for the future. By working closely with a wide range of partners, we will continue to develop new projects, secure investment and strengthen the Park's contribution to the cultural life of Wales.

Building a Sustainable Future

One of the Board's principal strategic priorities is to strengthen the Trust's financial sustainability.

The combination of the park and its walled garden, the old Bishop's Palace, Carmarthenshire Museum and the Tywi Valley Path creates exceptional opportunities to broaden our visitor offer, diversify income and attract new investment.

The Chair, working closely with the trust Treasurer, fellow Trustees and staff, will play a pivotal role in helping the Trust develop new sources of earned income, secure grants and philanthropic support, and build a financially resilient organisation capable of delivering its long-term ambitions.
